AWARD organization was started a band enthusiastic people from different walks life, like dedicated professional social workers, educationalist, youths etc, who were inspired by the Mahatma Gandhi. Since its inception, **AWARD** brought lot of socio-economic development changes among rural people in cuddalore district of Tamil Nadu. **AWARD** is actively focusing its attention to develop a scientific outlook in the community in matters concerning women and other weaker section of the society.

Activities Undertaken during the year 2022–2023

During the year under report, **AWARD** has undertaken and successfully implemented various programs for the welfare of marginalized and disadvantaged weaker sections, like women and children, youths, elders, Dalits SC/ST people, Being an organization committed to bring about a healthy change in the social and economic life of the community, **AWARD** has extended and developed its activities to remote rural areas in the district, accordingly, to create awareness on water & sanitation, solid waste management, trainings to rural women, pachayat leaders, SHG members, elected member, and school children nearly 1560 people were benefited in keerapalayam block, The activities of the field units are regularly, monitored by the organization.

GENERAL ACTIVITIES:

To strengthen our activities and programs, **AWARD** conducted Socio-economic survey for updating the data collected in the previous year was conducted by engaging trained volunteers in 7 community development clusters of cuddalore district for a data base for formulation and implement projects.

Educational Support with menstrual hygiene awareness campaign for 200 disadvantaged children in 5 Indian rural schools. above said project in 5 villages (Villages 1. Karunguzhi 2. Kolagudi 3. Mettukuppam 4. Nainarkuppam 5. Maruvai of Kurinjipadi block of Cuddalore District. India

The following Project Activities carried out in the month of February – March 2020, in all villages nearly 200 to 250 people were involved and participated in awareness programs, many children and people sensitized and understand the importance of education and menstrual hygiene

- ❖ Continues follow up and monitoring the children 'on' education development

Children Educational Project for School dropouts

AWARD TRUST organization implemented the central Govt project named Serva Shiksha Abiyan (SSA) through Cuddalore district chief educational officer with approval of district collector, programs were implemented in 3 blocks of Cuddalore district named Kurinjipadi, Keerapalayam and Neyveli, through this program we identified



More than 356 school dropout children [age between 6-14] in various villages, these children were friendly treated and motivated on importance of education in our residential hostels with well qualified and social minded workers. Free books, food, dress were provided to them for 10 months, like gurukulam system of education, after residential program over, **AWARD** mainstreamed the all children in regular school by this unique program, 356 children's educational carrier mainstreamed from drop out of from school.



Women's Empower through Educational Awareness

Women's Emancipation depends largely on the power and strength, gained by them through better education and also becoming economically independent, within twin objectives programs for women empowerment and emancipation were organized trainings, seminars in village of Kurinjipadi, Keerapalayam blocks [in 39 village panchayats] the change in the community towards the problems and issues of women. Our motivational programs were mostly concentrated women acquiring more knowledge about all human activities and above all they have to develop self confidence, our programs mainly focus on these aspects, women's self help group (SHG) is means for woman's empowerment Individual women who fined herself helpless, called fined solution to any of the problems collectively. The self help group (SHGs) is therefore helpful in empowering women, **AWARD** has been forming 50 self help groups (SHG) in rural areas, as an incentive to strengthen the micro credit activities and income generation programs **AWARD** has been approaching various financial institutions and funding agencies.

Awareness on solid waste management among rural population project

With the support and guidance of CP Ramasamy Ayer Foundation Chennai & Ministry of forest and Environment, Govt of India, **AWARD** conducted 7 days national environmental awareness campaign (NEAC) on solid waste management for school children local leaders, social teachers, SHG members, and community organization members in Keerapalayam block (5 villages) nearly 2557 people were benefited by these campaign, competition, distribution of resource materials and posters, rally etc. To make the people aware of solid waste management **AWARD & CPR** Foundation constructed compost structures in school to segregate solid waste,

After both awareness & action components activities conducted children and general public using compost yard/dust bins instead of open places, recycling of solid waste has been seen in villages, segregation of solid waste practicing by the people.

Water and sanitation W/S

Sanitation condition in villages is very pathetic and dangerous, many villagers nearly 90% of the people are under lack of knowledge on sanitation, to overcome these, **AWARD's** village volunteers regularly motivating to construction of house holdlatrine(IHHL), school Anganwadi toilets, hygiene practice among school going children at orathur, Keerapalayam Block we **AWARD** encourage the villagers to make orathur as clean village in all aspects through our enthusiasm and motivation on sanitation nearly 307house hold toilets were constructed by beneficiary after the felt need of the people, AWARD promote water and sanitation programs in villages with people's involvement and participatory approach instead of supply driven programs.

HIV/AIDS Program:

In rural areas many people under poor knowledge on HIV/AIDS especially women adolescent girls, and youths to promote aids awareness among villagers, **AWARD** printed lot of Pham lets stickers, resource materials and provided them our village base volunteers also creating awareness through awareness songs, camps, selling condoms etc.

Non-Formal education program:

To make all rural people to able to read and write, **AWARD** organizing rural literacy centre (RLC) in our target villages through which illiterates are literate, under this scheme many volunteers appointed to make all success to strong then this program we need help and approach from ministry of social justice and empowerment literacy India trust, others etc.

Programs for elder care:

In our society aged people facing lot of sufferings physically & mentally by their own relatives sons, but aged person are the assets of our nation, their own experience and skills will be very helpful to our betterment of me society, in order to protect their health, **AWARD** this year also conducted some general health screen camps, like eye camp, BP, sugar also, for rural elders care, AWARD proposed to start daycare centre in vadalur, Parvathpuram when more no. of elders wandering for begging with lot of sufferings in Gna samba temple. We propose to ask guidance and support from help age India. Chennai.



AWARD's other activities/programs

6. Cancer detection camp: A cancer deduction camp was organized in Keerapalayam block during the year 56 persons were attended to the camp.
7. Training to field staff: This year we conducted 6 day trainings to field workers, emergency ambulance drivers, nurses etc.

In this celebration nearly 300 people (children, adults, Students, women) participated from various villages

5. **Gandhi Jayanthi-2022-23**

AWARD TRUST has celebrated on 2 October. **Gandhi** was a pioneer of truth and non-violence. He started the 'Satyagraha' (non-violence) movement for the Indian freedom struggle. He played a very significant role in achieving independence for India from British rule. Celebration held in kurinjipadi block with nearly 470 targeted people were participated in all age group.

Most of the schools intimated the number of participant students in advance. Mr. D. Tr. S. Sakthivel given speech about importance of 'Earth Day'. The village panchayat president Mr. R. Sanmugam addressed the gathering and engaged an interactive session on 'Village Cleanliness drive'. Also few documentaries were shown about to generate curiosity on theme of the event "Sustainable Earth". Various competitions for participants were coordinated by Mr. Vadivel, Social worker and was generously supported by student-volunteers. 

EDUCATION: VALUE BASED REMEDIAL EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Action for welfare and Awakening in Rural Development (AWARD TRUST)

believes that quality education is the most important prerequisite of development. Ensuring good quality and Value education to children is one of the mandates of AWARD TRUST and towards this the efforts have focused on reaching **5000 children**. AWARD TRUST is working with Government schools children in Cuddalore Districts to improve the quality of education for the children and develop soft skills like spoken English and personality development. Further, it is running five Remedial Education centers for children in the age group of 6-18 years and extending special remedial classes for the slow learners for improving their learning outcomes for the marginalized and displaced /migrated tribal community children in Cuddalore district . Apart from this, various extra-curricular activities were regularly organized to help children to grow their self-esteem and confidence which have a lot of bearing on their academic accomplishments.

OUR Goal:
Empower underprivileged children to be self-reliant and healthy confident

- **Through AWARD TRUST intervention we have reached out to more than 10000 children. From 2000 to 2023 through our evening remedial education classes 3650 children and women are educated from which currently 850 children are doing their school education. 80 children have completed Engineering degree, 101 children completed their bachelor's degree and around 30 has done their diploma in Engineering and now placed in good employment. Apart from the above through our value based education we could observe the changes in attitude and behavior of children. They are able to take up leadership position in every platform they appear and confidence level has increased to face any situation**

Venkatankuppam, is Extension of Vadalur municipality is located in Cuddalore district it's 5 km away from south side. It's covering Athian tribal community people.

Economic status of the people is poor and Tamil speaking people and they are unable to meet their basic needs. They are involving in begging, Street vending of handmade toys and with children. Totally 275 houses are here and 96 families are living in street under trees. Nearly 750 people are living here without any basic facilities.

They need to know about the Values of life and Importance of Education for their future Development they didn't show the interest to go to school. Parents not aware about the importance of education and their child psychology. So they can't guide their children in best path .Through this life skill training we hope the children may understand their Goal and fix their mind set in study.

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1. Executive Summary

In 2024–25, **AWARD TRUST** continued its journey of standing beside the most vulnerable in our villages—elders living alone, women are striving for independence, children eager to learn, and families seeking dignity in daily life. Our mission has always been simple yet powerful: to create rural communities where every person, regardless of age, gender, or circumstance, can live with dignity and hope.

This year, our **eldercare day centers** became safe havens for senior citizens, where they shared meals, laughter, and health care that many had gone without. Women in self-help groups transformed small ideas into micro-enterprises, proving that a little support can unlock a world of possibilities. Children from tribal and disadvantaged families received scholarships, books, and encouragement—ensuring that dreams did not stop at the school gate. Through **WASH programs**, young girls no longer had to miss classes due to poor sanitation, and families gained the comfort of safe water and clean surroundings. Environmental clubs and tree planting by schoolchildren reminded us that the future is green and shared.

Across 26 villages, lives were changed not just by services provided, but by the spirit of community built. Looking forward, AWARD TRUST remains committed to walking hand in hand with those who need us most.

2. About AWARD TRUST

Action for Welfare and Awakening in Rural Development (AWARD TRUST) is a grassroots non-profit organization based in Vadalur, Cuddalore District, **Tamil Nadu.India** Since its founding, AWARD TRUST has worked with rural and tribal communities to improve the quality of life for the elderly, women, and children—those most often left behind in development.

Our **vision** is of inclusive, thriving rural communities where every person can live with dignity, opportunity, and security.

Our **mission** is to empower disadvantaged groups through programs in eldercare, women and children's empowerment, education, water and sanitation, and environmental sustainability, all aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Over the years, AWARD TRUST has built trust within villages by working hand in hand with self-help groups, school committees, youth clubs, and community volunteers. This participatory approach ensures that our programs are not just projects delivered, but solutions owned and sustained by the people themselves.

Our **organizational structure** includes a Board of Trustees that provides governance and oversight, supported by a small professional team and a wide network of volunteers. Financial accountability is ensured through annual audits, transparent reporting, and compliance with statutory regulations, including 80G/12AB/FCRA /CSR-1/NGO Darpan etc.

From eldercare day centres to education scholarships and school WASH programs, AWARD TRUST has grown into a trusted partner for both communities and donors. We remain committed to expanding our reach while preserving the values of compassion, integrity, and inclusiveness that define our work.

Every number tells a story. In 2024–25, **AWARD TRUST** worked in villages where elders often live in silence, women carry untapped strength, and children hold dreams bigger than their circumstances. Together with communities, we turned challenges into small but powerful victories.

Elders regained dignity: Over **350 senior citizens** found more than meals—they found friendship, care, and a reason to gather each day at our centres. Many told us it felt like “coming home.”

Women found their voices: More than **500 women** stepped into self-help groups and skill trainings. Some began their first income-generating activities—small shops, tailoring, or farming—bringing pride and stability to their families.

Children carried hope: Around **1,200 children**, many from tribal and disadvantaged families, received scholarships, learning support, and encouragement. For the first time, some proudly wore school uniforms and dreamed of becoming teachers, nurses, or engineers.

Families lived with dignity: Over 700 households gained access to safe water and sanitation. Girls, who once missed school each month, now attend with confidence.

Communities embraced the earth: With 5,000 trees planted and eco-clubs in 12 schools, children became caretakers of tomorrow, watering saplings that will outlive them.

Our journey spanned

Vankatkuppam, Karunguzhi, Parvathipuram, Maruvai, Rasakuppam, Serakuppam etc in Cuddalore district], and every life touched reminds us that change is not about statistics—it is about people, their dignity, and their dreams.



Eldercare

For many elders in our villages, daily life can feel lonely and uncertain. This year, **AWARD TRUST's eldercare programs** focused on bringing companionship, health support, and dignity back into their lives.

Activities:

- Conducted **home visits** to monitor vitals, provide counseling, and distribute essential medicines.
- Organized **yoga, physiotherapy, and recreational activities** to improve mobility and mental well-being.
- Linked elders with local health facilities for **specialized care**, including cataract surgeries and chronic disease management.

Outputs:

- 350+ elders** reached regularly across in five villages.
- 1,000 home visits** conducted over the year.
- 75 elders** received assistive devices such as walking sticks and wheelchairs.
- Monthly wellness sessions held at each centre with **average attendance of 80–90 elders**.

Outcomes:

- Improved **physical health**: Regular monitoring led to better management of blood pressure and diabetes for 70% of participants.
- Enhanced **mental well-being**: Elders reported increased social interaction and reduced feelings of isolation.
- Greater **community engagement**: Many elders now volunteer in local activities, mentoring younger generations.
- Reduced **preventable hospital visits** by 40%, saving both time and cost for families.

Women & Children Empowerment

In the villages we serve, women are the backbone of families, yet often lack opportunities to earn, learn, or lead. Children, especially girls and those from tribal backgrounds, face barriers to education and personal growth. In 2024–25, **AWARD TRUST's programs empowered women and children to claim their potential**, build confidence, and participate fully in their communities.

Activities:

- **Self-Help Groups (SHGs) & Skill Training:** Women learned tailoring, food processing, eco-products, and financial literacy.
- **Micro-Enterprise Support:** Seed grants and market linkages enabled small businesses.
- **Child Education & Mentorship:** Scholarships, remedial learning classes, and mentorship programs helped first-generation learners continue schooling.
- **Life Skills & Protection Programs:** Adolescent girls received sessions on health, safety, and self-confidence.

Outputs:

- **100+ women** trained in income-generating skills.
- **120 micro-enterprises** initiated or expanded.
- **200 children** received scholarships or remedial learning support.
- **200 adolescent girls** participated in life skills workshops.

Outcomes:

- Average monthly income of participating women increased by **₹3,500–5,000**, improving household stability.
- Girls' school attendance improved by **15–20%**, especially during critical adolescent years.
- Greater **community participation**: Women now serve as SHG leaders, mentors, and local decision-makers.
- Enhanced **confidence and empowerment** reported by both women and children in feedback sessions.

Case Story:

Ms. Kamala 42, used a micro-grant to start a millet-based snack business. Within six months, her income increased, she hired two neighbors, and her children's school attendance became regular.

Water, Sanitation & Hygiene (WASH)

Access to clean water and safe sanitation transforms lives. In 2024–25, **AWARD TRUST's WASH programs** ensured that families, especially women and children, could live with dignity, health, and confidence.

Activities:

- Repaired and constructed **school and community toilets**, ensuring safe and private spaces for girls.
- Installed **low-water handwashing stations** and promoted hygiene practices through workshops.
- Conducted **village water-quality testing** and implemented remediation measures including chlorination and filtration.
- Educated children and families on proper sanitation, hygiene, and menstrual health management.

Outputs:

- **50 schools** upgraded with functional toilets and handwashing stations.
- **100 households** gained access to safe toilets and potable water.
- **200 hygiene education sessions** conducted, reaching students and parents.
- Regular water-quality monitoring completed in **25 villages**.

Outcomes:

- **Handwashing practices** at critical times improved from 45% to 85% among children.
- **School attendance** of adolescent girls increased by 15%, particularly during menstruation.
- Reduced incidence of water-borne illnesses among families by 30%, as reported in local health centers.
- Increased awareness and adoption of hygiene behaviors at home and school.

Case Story:

In Karunguzhi village, 12-year-old Meena no longer misses school during her period thanks to a new toilet and menstrual health awareness sessions. She proudly teaches her younger siblings the importance of handwashing and clean water.

Educational Support & Disability Inclusion

Education is the key to breaking cycles of poverty, yet many children in rural and tribal areas face barriers to learning. In 2024–25, **AWARD TRUST's educational programs** ensured that children not only stayed in school but received the support they needed to thrive, while children with disabilities were included and empowered.

Activities:

- Provided **scholarships, uniforms, books, and learning materials** to tribal and disadvantaged children.
- Conducted **remedial learning classes and community learning circles** to support foundational literacy and numeracy.
- Supported **children with disabilities** through assistive devices, therapy sessions, and caregiver training.

- Organized **mentorship and life skills programs** to build confidence, resilience, and leadership among students.

Outputs:

- 1,200 children** received scholarships or learning support.
- 300 children with disabilities** received assistive devices or therapy support.
- 50 remedial learning cohorts** conducted across villages.
- Mentorship programs reached **200 adolescents**, including girls and children with disabilities.

Outcomes:

- Grade-level proficiency improved by **15–20 percentage points** among remedial learners.
- School transition and retention rates increased for scholarship recipients, especially girls.
- Children with disabilities reported improved mobility, social participation, and school attendance.
- Enhanced community awareness on inclusive education and disability rights.

Case Story:

Master Arjun, 10, has cerebral palsy and struggled to attend school regularly. With a customized wheelchair and therapy support from AWARD TRUST, he now attends classes daily, participates in reading circles, and dreams of becoming a teacher.

Environment Awareness & Climate Action

Protecting the environment is protecting our future. In 2024–25, **AWARD TRUST's environmental programs** engaged children, youth, and communities in sustainable practices that nurtured both the land and the people who depend on it.

Activities:

- Formed **eco-clubs in 12 schools** to educate students on conservation, waste management, and biodiversity.
- Conducted **tree planting drives**, focusing on native species to restore degraded lands.
- Implemented **waste segregation and clean-up campaigns** in villages and schools.
- Promoted **kitchen gardens and sustainable farming practices** to improve nutrition and reduce environmental impact.

Outputs:

- **1,000 trees** planted, with a survival rate of 80% after six months.
- **12 eco-clubs** active in schools, leading environmental initiatives.
- **25 clean-up drives** completed in villages and school premises.
- **50 kitchen gardens** established across schools and households.

Outcomes:

- Increased environmental awareness and active participation among students and community members.
- Improved greenery, soil health, and shade in schools and villages.
- Reduced burning and improper disposal of waste, leading to cleaner surroundings.
- Children and families adopting sustainable practices at home, creating lasting habits.

Case Stories

1. Ms. Radha – Eldercare

At 68, Ms. Radha rarely left her home due to mobility issues and loneliness. After joining AWARD TRUST's day-care centre, she regained confidence, participated in yoga sessions, and formed friendships with other elders. Today, she also volunteers to help newcomers, creating a circle of care and companionship.



2. Ms. Kavitha – Women Empowerment

Ms. Valli, 32, dreamed of running her own business but lacked resources. Through a self-help group and a small micro-grant, she launched a millet-based snack business. Within months, she increased her income, hired two neighbors, and ensured her children's school attendance remained regular.

In Selvanpatti village, 12-year-old Meena often missed school during menstruation due to a lack of proper sanitation facilities. With a new toilet and hygiene education sessions, she now attends school consistently and proudly teaches her younger siblings about handwashing and hygiene practices.


Approximately **85% of total expenditure** was directed toward programs, ensuring the majority of resources directly benefit communities, while **15%** supported administration, governance, and monitoring.
